Dwight K. Lomayesva (Hopi) is Lead Coordinator of the Southern California Tribal Digital Village, Infrastructure.

The Tribal Digital Village Project has been created from a three-year grant from Hewlett-Packard to the Southern California Tribal Chairman's Association (SCTCA). SCTCA has outlined their commitment to provide tribes with the fundamental tools of technology, to communicate with one another, and to the world. To do this, SCTCA has made a commitment to create a network that connects all the SCTCA tribes together through a private network and provide access to the Internet. SCTCA has pledged to bring greater technology, in equipment, to the tribes in advancing to meet the challenges that the future brings to Indian Country.

SCTCA's primary goal is to bring technology into Indian Country and create a greater future for the SCTCA tribes and for future generations. This will be done through training of designated community members to develop the network connecting the SCTCA tribes, and by working with the tribes to develop strategies on allocating greatly needed equipment for education and tribal administration.

Dwight, as lead, coordinates all of the infrastructure efforts in creating a wireless backbone across the San Diego County region spanning 200 miles and training efforts to encompass the tribal communities of San Diego County.

He received his BA from San Diego State University.
